Children in our care are required to do eight weeks on various programmes to help them learn new skills – one of the ways we equip them with knowledge and empower them to shine!

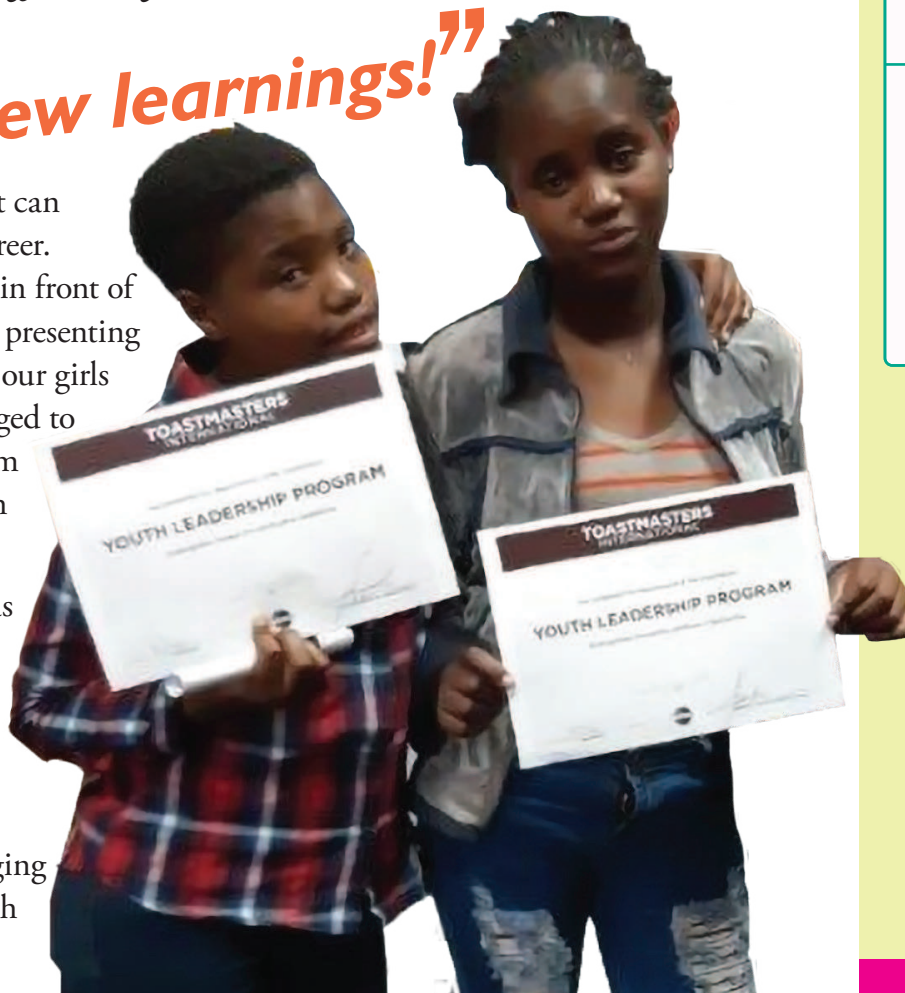
“And now... a toast!”

They were encouraged to participate in discussions, brainstorm new ideas and share these ideas with each other.

Everyone who attended was presented with certificates of completion. It was wonderful to see some learners really shine during the programme, and we hope it opens new doors to confidence for them. We look forward to encouraging new young leaders in future through this programme.

Dear Partners in Care

We hope that this newsletter finds you and your family well and happy.

There can be no doubt that life at GBTSA brings us new challenges every day. Those that are most familiar emanate from our individual youth, their unique responses to our world and their healing process, preparing our staff teams for creative shifts needed in responding to and healing our young and vulnerable girls and boys, maintenance of our buildings and campuses, and so on.

Those that are truly challenging and taxing are those that fall outside of our areas of expertise and training – those of structural building challenges – and fixing those problems! God in his wisdom hands us only challenges that we can manage and so our Tongaat, KZN campus, despite consistent and routine maintenance over the many years, has begun collapsing.

According to the engineers, the foundations in many of these buildings were not built robustly enough

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to securely hold them solidly in place over the past 80 to 100 years – and they have been deemed to be structurally unsound. You will thus become aware of our newly launched ‘Tongaat Capital Campaign’ where we are endeavouring to raise the R68 million required to restore our Tongaat campus as we continue to care for abused, vulnerable and abandoned young people – and continue your legacy.

Our greatest concern is to ensure that we are able to keep our fundraising in meeting the needs of our children’s daily needs of education, food, therapy, etc - separate from that of fundraising for the ‘Tongaat Capital Campaign’ as we rebuild a safe haven for our youth there. So our appeal to you and all of our regular donors is to not shift your funding from direct support of the children to the campaign funding. We would, however, be deeply grateful should you wish to support the campaign over and above your regular donation for our children – as this is an enormous challenge to us, especially in these economic times!

Thank you for always being there for us – and our children. Without your help and partnership we would not be helping and healing our vulnerable children, whose progress and achievements are evident in the pages of this publication.

Learners embrace the working world

Preparing for life after Girls & Boys Town is something we take very seriously, and one of the ways we can begin to prepare our youth is by getting them to think about their future careers.

Silverstar, in collaboration with The Education Agency, sponsor a Career Development programme which includes a Job Shadowing Day and Professionals Day for high school learners – two highlights of the year!

The programme provides a pipeline of development for learners from Grades 9 to 12 to help them find the right career direction.

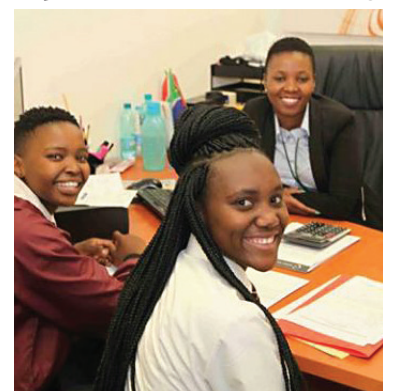
It starts in Grade 9 with an online evaluation that identifies skills and aptitudes to match personality types, and highlights suitable career opportunities, which in turn guides subject

choices. In Grade 10, learners attend workshops, which include Professionals Day and exploring tertiary education options. Grade 11 learners are then given the opportunity for job shadowing, and assistance in higher education applications and job-readiness training, which intensifies in Grade 12.

It was our Grade 11 learners’ turn to get a taste of the working world at their recent Job Shadow Day at Silverstar – preparing them for bright futures in their own careers and entrepreneurial initiatives. They got to chat to employees and hear first-hand from many who had to overcome odds of their own to thrive in their careers today – what an encouragement to our girls and boys!

Project Courtyard at Tongaat, KZN!

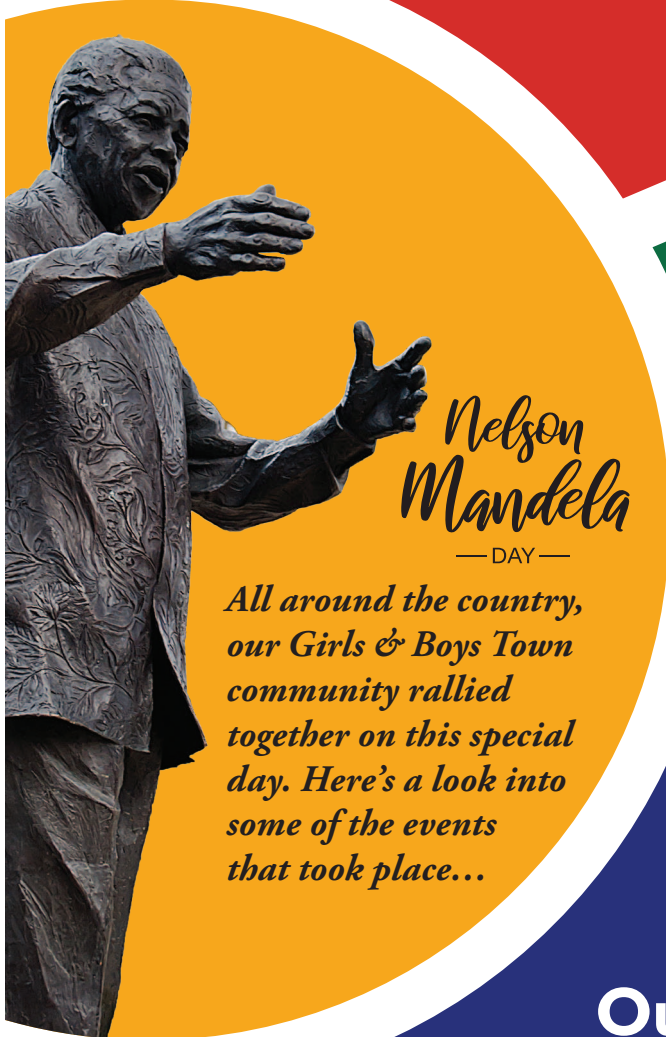

LEARNING FROM EXPERIENCE

THE GREAT ANNUAL WILDERNESS LEADERSHIP EXCURSION

Five of our youth were recently given the opportunity to go on a leadership excursion in the wilderness, kindly donated to them by a game lodge.

As a number of our youngsters have learnt in the past, you can find guidance in behaviour from all kinds of places – not least the wild spaces of our country.

The exercises have been found to have a positive impact on a young adult's behaviour, mood, interpersonal relationships, and social skills, and have greatly helped the Girls & Boys Town Youth who get the opportunity to go.

The theme of this year's trip focused on awareness of nature, respect for nature and introspection at how we respond to nature. It was a chance at self-discovery and new found independence for these budding leaders – a rite of passage!

We are incredibly thankful for the opportunity to return to the game lodge. It's faultless safety record, the highly skilled guides, carefully facilitated programmes and years of experience make it somewhere we love to come back to year after year.



Here's what some of the girls and boys had to say about the experience...

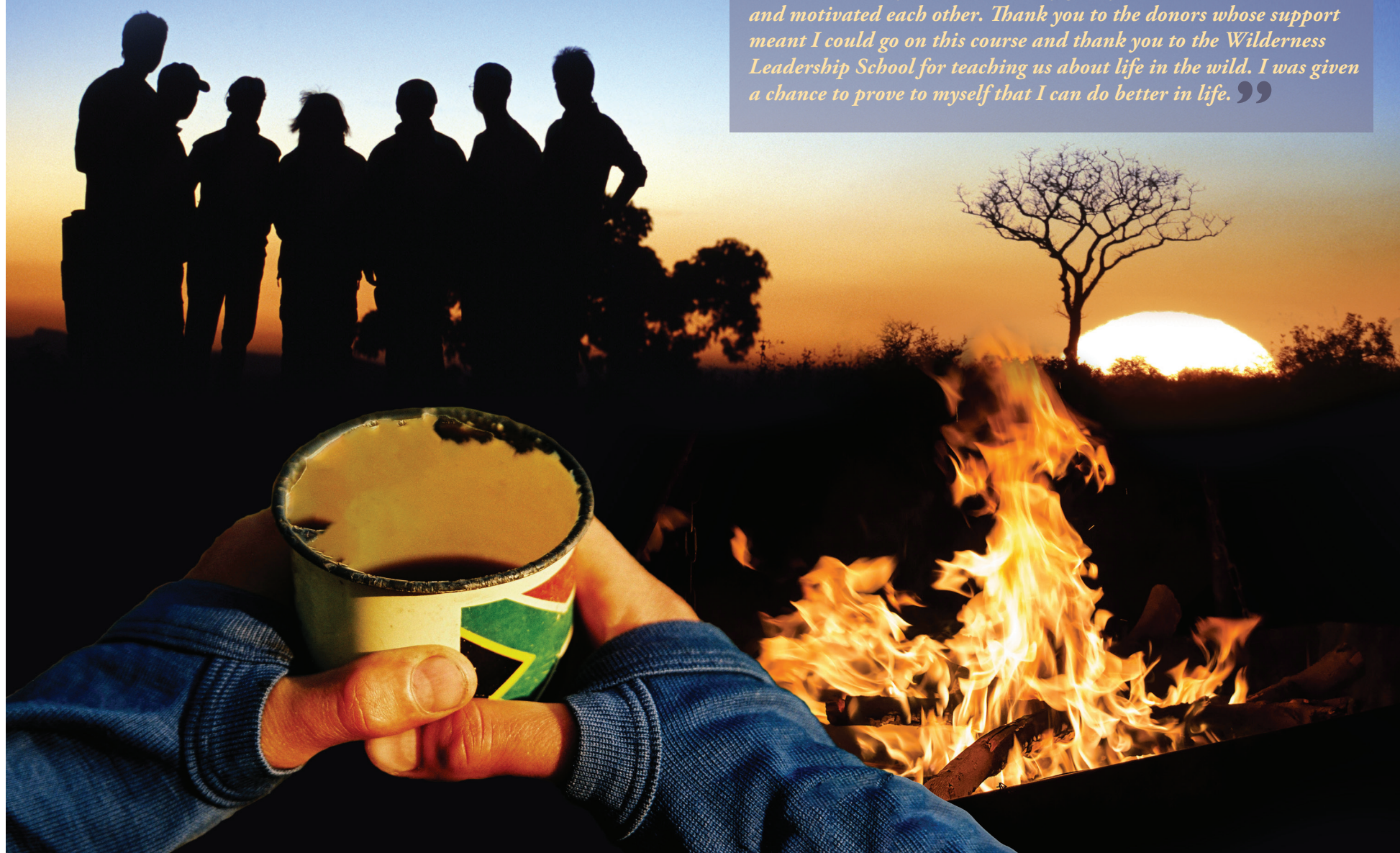
“While at the lodge I learned that you must work with others. Everyone has their weaknesses and you need to help where you can.

There is more to life than what I thought. I learnt more about nature and animals, how they live, how they interact with each other and how they act when we're around.”

“I learned to value the company of those around me. In the wilderness helping each other out is essential - you have a responsibility to other people, for example the night watch duty.

I will not forget this experience. It gave me the opportunity to be educated about nature and I left having learnt new skills about life and the bush.”

“While away we made a lot of good friends and shared stories and motivated each other. Thank you to the donors whose support meant I could go on this course and thank you to the Wilderness Leadership School for teaching us about life in the wild. I was given a chance to prove to myself that I can do better in life.”
